Dr Aniket Nadkarni is testing vitamin C against the standard treatment to reduce dangerous brain swelling, aiming for safer, faster recovery.

CATCHING PARKINSON'S EARLY

Dr Angus McNamara is creating a framework to detect Parkinson's early, giving patients interventions and hope before irreversible damage occurs.

STIMULATING RELIEF AFTER SPINAL CORD INJURY

PhD student **Ryan Dorrian** is testing a novel device to deliver wireless stimulation to damaged nerves, reducing neuropathic pain and improving quality of life.

Pioneering Children's Cancer Research



Prof Quenten Schwarz has secured \$3 million in Federal funding to uncover the genetic changes that predispose children to brain cancer, with the goal of developing safer and more effective therapies. This vital work was kickstarted by NRF support.

In Newcastle, Professor Matt Dun and his team have received \$18.7 million in Federal funding to investigate high grade gliomas, with the ambitious aim of bringing new therapies to clinical trial within just five years.

Adelaide-based paediatric oncologist Professor Jordan Hansford will lead national clinical trials of a promising new agent, the brain-penetrant Protein Kinase C inhibitor JLD14, offering much-needed hope for more effective treatment options.

The growing Federal investment in these cuttingedge projects underscores the importance and promise of advancing childhood brain cancer research —progress that would not have been possible without the foundational seed funding provided by the NRF.



When Kristen Wilkins was diagnosed with a brain tumour, her family's world changed overnight. Thanks to the dedication of her medical team, Kristen recovered, and today she and her family are determined to help others facing the same frightening diagnosis.

Through their Foundation, the Wilkins family funded the SONOCA 300 neuroendoscopy ultrasonic aspirator for the Women's and Children's Hospital, the only tool of its kind in South Australia. This technology enables minimally invasive tumour removal, allowing faster recovery and less damage to healthy brain tissue. Their remarkable generosity is a gift of hope for countless children and families. The NRF and the patients who will benefit for years to come are profoundly thankful to the Wilkins family for this life-changing donation.

Shimmi for Immi: A Family's Gift of Love

On what would have been her 21st birthday, more than 200 friends, family and supporters gathered at Jarmer's Kitchen to celebrate the life of Imogen Cenko. Imogen passed away at just 9 years old in 2014, after a sudden and devastating diagnosis of acute disseminated encephalomyelitis (ADEM).

Through their event "A Night to Shine and Remember: Shimmi for Immi", the Cenko family raised \$18,677 for the NeuroSurgical Research Foundation, funding the LEVICS Micro-Instrument — a tool that helps neurosurgeons safely remove tumours close to vital brain areas while preserving healthy tissue.

Every time this equipment is used, Imogen's legacy lives on in the children and families it helps. We are deeply grateful to the Cenko family for their generosity — on behalf of the NRF, and the many patients whose lives will be changed by this gift.
